

Foster care is the backbone of the Victorian response to protective intervention for children and young people at risk. Foster carers are the volunteers providing a home, family life and care to children and young people who are unable to live with their birth family or kin for a variety of reasons. Many of these children have suffered traumatic events and the role of foster carers is critical and complex to provide a safe and healing environment for children and young people to reach their full potential.

The Foster Care Association of Victoria (FCAV) provides independent information, support and advocacy directly to all Victorian foster carers and families. Our work directly impacts the care provided to the thousands of Victorian children and young people in foster care by providing:

**Carer Support Service** - free, independent learning and development, therapeutic support, advice and phone or online advocacy and support for foster carers.

**Advocacy** - on behalf of foster carers to government, their agencies or ACCOs, and raising the profile of foster care in the community.

**Programs and Events** - as the only centralised body for all foster carers in the state; providing forums, peer support and carer events.

Foster Care News and Information - through our comprehensive website, regular newsletters and social media sites.

The FCAV represents all foster carers across Victoria. In tandem with the support we provide to individual foster carers, our role as a membership association is to advocate for vital improvements to the foster care system. Our member base consists of foster carers, kinship and permanent carers, and supporters from the wider sector and community.

The Foster Care Association of Victoria aims to strengthen Victoria's investment and resources for home-based carers and the children and young people in their care.

# **President Report**

Welcome to the Annual Report of the Foster Care Association of Victoria (FCAV) for 2023/24.

This year has presented significant challenges for foster carers, the sector and, by extension, the children and young people in our care. It has been a privilege to work alongside the dedicated staff and Board of the FCAV to address these challenges through focused research, support, and advocacy.

The FCAV's Carer Census, combined with our Carer Snapshot, has provided us with sobering insights, particularly regarding attrition rates. Notably, 35% of respondents are sole carers. The census highlighted that 62% of carers are supporting children with disabilities. This data has been crucial in identifying where the FCAV can best respond to the resource and support needs of carers. Respect for carers and their treatment in these demanding roles is vital to their ability to continue providing care.

The stressors identified, such as inadequate financial and wraparound supports, are failing to effectively serve the children in our care. Despite these challenges, carers remain motivated by the positive impact they have on the children and young people in their homes—whether for a day, a week, or a lifetime. An encouraging 86% of respondents reported that witnessing positive change and growth in the child or young person is the most rewarding aspect of their role, with contributing to the community also being a significant reward.

While the FCAV has, and will continue, to engage with the sector's focus on future reforms, we remain steadfast in addressing the immediate gaps affecting current carers and the children in their care today.

Throughout this year, I have been proud to pursue the FCAV's advocacy and support goals alongside our dedicated Board of Directors. The skills, opportunities and commitment each Director brings are vital to upholding the FCAV's governance and mission to support and represent foster carers in Victoria. I extend my sincere thanks to each of them for their time and expertise. I also want to acknowledge the dedicated staff of the FCAV, led by Chief Executive Officer, Samantha Hauge. This small, action-oriented team is laser-focused on ensuring that the work of the FCAV is carer-driven.

By building partnerships and positioning the organisation as a critical service provider, the FCAV is able to pursue advocacy and leverage its members' calls to action while remaining fiercely independent.

My involvement in the Care Allowance Campaign, work with the media, and collaboration with our new Ambassadors, alongside our growing evidence of carer needs, has strengthened my determination to advocate for solutions, policy changes, and best practice in carer support. Our mission is to ensure that foster carers, the backbone of the child protection system, are supported and retained to provide safe homes and loving care, preventing vulnerable children and young people from being placed in residential or contingency care. Whether they return safely to their parents, or transfer to kin or permanent care, all children and young people deserve to be in loving homes, not with a worker or paid employee, every day of their lives.

For this selfless role you undertake, I thank you and stand with you. Knowing what our members need and what matters to them drives the FCAV's strategic objectives. While it is gratifying to reflect on the work we have accomplished over the past 12 months, I look forward to the next year as FCAV President with a sense of urgency and determination for change.

# **CEO Report**

It is an honour to lead the Foster Care Association of Victoria and my pleasure to introduce the Annual Report of 2023/24. This year has been marked by both significant challenges and notable progress in carer services.

Despite a tight fiscal year, the FCAV has successfully managed to expand its services for carers. With funding from the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing, we have ensured that the Carer Assistance Program's counselling service is now available to carers on a permanent basis. Additionally, we have expanded support hours and are now offering a full-time counselling service. Our Learning and Development program has seen higher carer participation, and we are consistently receiving positive feedback from carers who have benefited from information, support and advice provided by our Carer Support Team.

We have also completed a major carer census, providing crucial evidence of carer experiences and priorities, and successfully begun implementing the new FCAV Strategic Plan.

Additionally, we welcomed our first Carer Ambassadors, Fiona and Mike te Wierik, who are already playing a pivotal role in promoting the goals of FCAV and supporting carers.

The Roadshow around Victoria has been a highlight of the past 12 months for me. Meeting people in person, putting names to faces, and hearing directly from agency and ACCO CEOs, staff, and carers across the state has been invaluable. These interactions have deepened our understanding that we all share common goals for better support for foster carers and helped shape FCAV advocacy and support we can provide. The collaboration fostered during these trips has been invaluable.

I am grateful to each agency and ACCO that has endorsed the FCAV/PCA Families, Care Allowance Campaign and to everyone who has made a submission. While progress from the Government has been slow, the awareness raised is making an impact. We have continued to work closely with our carer peak counterparts in other states and territories on the National Foster and Kinship Care Collective. Working together, our voice has been amplified in advocating and lobbying for a better home-based care system for carers and the children and young people in their care. Although homebased care systems operate at a state level, the common issues transcend state boundaries. Through the National Collective, we have fostered collaborative thinking, knowledge sharing, and unity in the needs of children and carers at a national level. This collective has been a vital source of courage, strength and knowledge, and I express my gratitude to each member.

The achievements of the FCAV are a testament to our dedicated team of staff who continue to deliver innovative carer-focused and member-led supports, data, resources, services, events, and advocacy. Their hard work directly improves the carer experience and the care sector overall, and I sincerely thank them for their commitment.

I am deeply grateful for the support of FCAV's President, Megan Sadlier, and the entire Board of Directors in providing good corporate governance for the organisation. I extend my thanks to these busy carers who have dedicated their time and effort in their roles on the FCAV Board, as well as the expert co-opted directors whose unwavering commitment to the FCAV mission has significantly contributed to our technological infrastructure, financial management, human resource management and legal oversight, throughout the year.

Above all, I extend my sincere gratitude to the carers and FCAV members of Victoria who have dedicated their time, not just to the children and young people in their care but to engaging with carer services and events, research and learning and development opportunities for their own continuous learning.

Fostering is a journey filled with challenges and triumphs, and the impact of your dedication, love and support for our state's vulnerable children and young people in care is inspiring and can make such a positive and lasting impression that can shape lives for the better.

We have a significant task ahead to better meet the needs of foster carers in this state, but it is important to reflect on the achievements of the past 12 months, of which we are proud. We hope you enjoy reading about them in this year's report.

#### Hope in a Suitcase Partnership – making children feel worthy, loved & hopeful.



# **Carer Census 2024**

The FCAV conducted a carer census in April/May 2024, with over **750 respondent carers** participating. This strong response enhances our understanding and advocacy for addressing the unique challenges faced by foster carers in Victoria.

The insights from this census will inform FCAV's service delivery and advocacy, guiding improvements in the services, resources and respect for the role provided within the home-based care system. The census offers both demographic and attitudinal data, shedding light on carers' experiences, including their relationships and wellbeing within the home-based care services of their agency, the Department, and Child Protection.



Carer participation in society is high, with **83%** holding an **educational qualification**—**26%** with a bachelor's degree, **24%** with a post-graduate degree and **33%** with a diploma. A majority (**69%**) are employed, with **35%** earning over \$120,000 annually and **36%** between \$60,000 and \$120,000. Carers report a high Life Satisfaction Index score of **79%**.

For **86%** of respondents, the most rewarding aspect of foster care is **seeing positive changes** in the child or young person, with contributing to the community also of significance. However, financial challenges, such as inadequate care allowances and funding for expenses, are consistently the most highlighted issues, regardless of household income. Inclusion and respect within care teams also rank among the top three challenges.



Among the respondents, **35% are sole carers**, with **90%** of these being **women**. Additionally, **62%** care for a child or young person with a physical or intellectual disability.



Notably, **24%** are considering **taking a break**, **leaving** or are **uncertain** about **continuing to care**, with those who have been caring for **a year or more** reporting a significant **change in motivation**.

### Over 95% of respondents find FCAV's services,


support, and information

**useful**, with **85%** strongly agreeing **that FCAV provides practical support** and would recommend it to others. Additionally, **63%** are interested in **online learning** and development opportunities, and nearly half want to access peer connection opportunities in the coming year.



The census also allowed carers to share their experiences, motivations and needs, highlighting both the positive and challenging aspects of their roles. Key themes include a deep commitment to children's wellbeing, inadequate support and communication from agencies and the Department, financial strain, emotional and mental health challenges, work-life balance issues, challenges with children's needs and behaviour, and systemic inefficiencies and injustices.

Thank you to the carers who participated in the census, providing valuable insights into carer needs and experiences in Victoria.



# **Membership Report**

The Foster Care Association of Victoria welcomed **271** new full members and **54** associate members to the organisation this past year. This increases our total membership to over **4,300** full and associate members.

All new FCAV members are sent, via email and post, a welcome pack which includes information related to all the free support and services they are eligible for, and the easiest way to connect with our Carer Support Team.

The FCAV continues to engage with members in numerous ways including regular newsletters, conducting quarterly check-ins with a range of members, posting online, and hosting forums, events and opportunities for carers to share their fostering experiences and issues, ask questions and build community.

#### **Carer Snapshot Report 2024**

The 2024 FCAV Foster Carer Snapshot Report, collected for March 2024 indicates a further decline in active carer households in Victoria. There are **1683 active carer households** available to take placements of children and young people in Victoria, a **net loss of 93** active foster carer households compared to last year.

Looking at the data by DFFH Division Area, we see that the South and West divisions have historically had the highest number of active carer households and that the South saw a sharp decline in the period. The East division has been steadily increasing in active carer households but the North division area continues to see a consistent decrease in the number of active carer households over the years.

Another record year of households exiting coupled with an **18% drop** in interested households undertaking the accreditation process, continues to highlight a worrying trend in the availability of foster carer households in Victoria.



### **Carer Support Team Report**

#### **Carer Advocates**

The Carer Support Team comprises Carer Advocates providing information, advice and advocacy to foster carers (enquiries), Carer Assistance Program (CAP) providing short-term counselling to foster and permanent carers & adoptive parents (referrals) and a Learning and Development stream delivering a range of forums for carers.

The Carer Support Team responded to and closed **946** enquiries/ referrals, delivering **1701** hours of service in the 2023/2024 period.

#### **Foster Care Enquiries**

The Carer Advocates provided information to **204**, advice to **266** and advocacy to **135** foster care enquiries in the 2023/2024 period.

The highest number of enquiries were in relation to carers seeking advice. Many carers were unsure of processes and systems within their agencies and reported having insecure relationships with agency and child protection staff. Sometimes this is a result of carers not feeling valued or respected in the system and needing reassurance.

Advocacy is a significant component of the work provided to carers. Often relationships with professionals are broken and the FCAV is mediating on behalf of carers, advising them of their rights and supporting them in navigating the complexities in the home-based care system.

A large proportion of our work is advocating for carers' rights and supporting carers through the difficult CIMS investigation process. We support carers preparing for investigation interviews, for suitability panel and provide advice in relation to reviews and appeals of decisions.

The highest frequency issues for foster care enquiries related to CIMS investigations, agency and DFFH matters. Considerable time was spent on financial support (care allowance rates/level) and permanent care (foster to permanent care conversion).

#### **Client Incident Management (CIMS) Investigations**

The Carer Advocates responded to and closed **104** CIMS enquiries, delivering **465** hours of service in the 2023/2024 period. This accounted for **43%** of overall service delivery hours.

The multiple layers of CIMS (investigation, Reportable Conduct Scheme, S81 investigations) result in confusion and repeated carer enquiries for support and clarity of these processes, with each enquiry averaging approximately **3** hours of support. More complex cases have required **6** to **25** hours of support.

The FCAV has continued to meet with the CIMS review team, reporting on significant shortfalls in the principles of procedural fairness within the CIMS investigation process. The FCAV has continued to provide feedback for improvement to the investigation process including a proposal for an Industry Code of Practice for the CIMS investigation process.

#### **Agency Issues**

The Carer Advocates provided support to **175** enquiries relating to agencies, accounting for **241** hours of service. Communication, planning and support was by far the largest category of referrals with **115** service hours.

The FCAV has information sheets for carers and agency staff as a guide to building respectful relationships and creating a working agreement between a worker and carer to establish good practice by both parties. Carer feedback shows significant frustration with the number of workers each carer will experience in their care journey.

The FCAV has conducted a Roadshow visiting **90%** of all agencies across the state. (See Roadshow report p. 18).

#### **DFFH Issues**

The Carer Advocates provided support to **88** enquiries relating to DFFH, accounting for **182** hours of service. Significant time was spent on complex matters relating to removal of child, complaints and lack of support.

The FCAV supports carers through the complaints processes to ensure they have an opportunity to be heard. This guidance is key to de-escalating carers' concern which in turn, supports retention of foster carers in Victoria.

#### YOUR WELLBEING MATTERS

The Carer Assistance Program (CAP) received **341** referrals for short-term counselling, delivering **617** hours of service in the 2023/2024 period.

#### **Foster Care**

While the majority (80%) of foster carers require 1–3 counselling sessions, 10 individuals required longer term counselling from 4–10 sessions.

Mental health, CIMS and grief & loss continue to be the most common issues for foster carers seeking emotional support.

The majority **(88%)** of permanent carers book **1–3** counselling sessions, though in some cases the issues are so complex and multi-faceted that individuals are seeking longer term counselling from **4–13** sessions.

In this case the CAP Worker will develop a discharge plan with referral to another support service. In some instances, the carers are accessing a mental health support plan, alongside the CAP program due to the complexity of issues they are navigating.

#### **Permanent Care**

Most permanent carers are seeking emotional support due to the challenging behaviours of children in their care. Mental health, placement breakdown and birth family issues were also common themes in the year.

The FCAV delivered a series of CAP Group sessions. This provided an opportunity for carers to validate their issues and share with others who have similar experiences. Carers welcomed the group experience.

We have only offered daytime sessions; however, it would be worth considering offering evening online sessions to assist carers accessing the valuable experience if group sessions are held.

The CAP this year celebrated the provision of ongoing and increased funding which has also enabled an expansion of the program to deliver a full time service. This will improve availability of counsellors for foster carers, permanent carers and adoptive families. "Jake is a wonderful, knowledgeable support and without his insight and help I would not be where I am today... Thank you so much."

"Tonya was an amazing support for me. She has a very gentle approach and brings out complex issues to the surface very effectively in a non-intrusive manner."

Program feedback has been excellent. Carers report on the ease of the referral and appointment process, the kindness of staff who facilitate the referrals and appointments, as well as the direct support by the counsellors.

#### **CAP** Therapeutic Group Sessions

This year, the CAP trialled therapeutic group sessions for eligible carers across foster and permanent carers and adoptive families. These sessions provided reflective spaces for carers to discuss their experiences, addressing common challenges such as:

- navigating complex behaviours in young people
- balancing multiple family needs
- prioritising self-care and learning to have selfcompassion.

Feedback has highlighted the importance of sharing experiences as well as opportunities for carers to connect with each other.

The CAP continues to offer individual therapeutic sessions that significantly enhance the capacity of carers to provide effective and compassionate care.

These sessions help carers manage the stress within their daily lives and reduce feelings of burnout. The therapeutic space provides crucial avenues for:

- support
- guidance
- coping strategies
- a safe space to debrief about challenging topics such as CIMS investigations

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- considerations of relinquishment
- personal mental health challenges
- support through grief and loss.

## Learning and Development

This report summarises our Learning and Development activities over the past year, showcasing our commitment to supporting foster carers and promoting cultural understanding and wellbeing among the children in their care.

Carer feedback on FCAV Learning and Development events shows that sessions have provided carers with a range of benefits:

- opportunities for learning
- networking and connection
- validation
- advocacy on complexities with the care system
- understanding the importance of self-care activities and mental health wellbeing

#### **Cultural Days**

Throughout the year, we organised several cultural events to promote cultural awareness and connection among foster care families and the children in their care:

### 21st October 2023: Krowathunkoolong Keeping Place, Bairnsdale

In collaboration with GEGAC and local Elder, Uncle Robert Hudson, a smoking ceremony was held, followed by a tour of the Keeping Place Museum. Children viewed paintings of their family members and engaged in cultural activities, including dilly bag making, boomerang lessons, and art using sand and clay.

#### 16th January 2024: Islamic Museum, Thornbury

Partnering with Project Us Foundation and Settlement Services International, participants explored artworks by Muslim artists and listened to a talk by Sheik Saeed Warsama. The event fostered community connections through a mentoring program for children.

#### 23rd January 2024: Rippleside Park, Geelong

In partnership with MacKillop and Meli Foster Care, Melinda Gaye Walker, a Wadawurrung Traditional Owner, provided a Welcome to Country and showcased Aboriginal artifacts. The day included traditional dance lessons and art activities, enhancing cultural understanding and connection.

These cultural days provided valuable learning experiences, helping children and carers connect with culture and each other. The events also facilitated networking among carers, promoting mutual support.

#### **Caring Thru Art**

Two art therapy sessions were conducted:

- 14th March 2023: Boot Factory, Coburg
- 14th March 2024: Anderson Inlet Anglers Club, Inverloch

These sessions included art therapy techniques, discussions on self-care, meditation, mindfulness, and the exploration of Gratitude Cards. Carers appreciated the opportunity to connect with others facing similar challenges, making the sessions a safe space to share experiences and support each other.

#### **School Presentations**

We delivered presentations on foster care to various schools, engaging with students to raise awareness:

#### 1st August 2023: Parade College

Students from multiple schools participated, learning about foster care and the role of FCAV.

#### 29th August 2023: Yarrawonga Secondary School

Year 12 students engaged in discussions about the foster care system, showing interest in understanding the support available to children in care.

#### Managing Stress & Developing Respectful Relationships Training

This training was developed to address the challenges faced by carers in building effective relationships with workers and teams:

#### 22nd August 2023: Meli Foster Care

This training emphasised the importance of respectful relationships with case workers and care teams.

#### 19th March 2024: Online Webinar

The webinar covered practical actions for fostering respectful relationships and included role-playing exercises. Feedback was positive, highlighting the value of real-life scenario practice.

#### **Carer Support Group**

On 14th May 2024, training was held in Geelong to develop a Carer Support Group, aiming to reduce isolation and promote self-care among carers. The session was well-received, with attendees appreciating the opportunity to connect with local carers.

#### Impact of Neglect on Children in Care Webinar

On 26th March 2024, Annette Jackson from Berry Street presented her research on childhood neglect. The webinar presented findings on the research conducted by Annette Jackson in partnership with Latrobe University and Dr Bruce Perry. It provided insights into the consequences of neglect and the crucial role carers play in a child's recovery.

#### **Client Incident Management System (CIMS) Investigations Webinar**

On 27th June 2024, an online session was held with Chris Craig and Leigh Hillman, covering the CIMS investigation process. The webinar offered comprehensive knowledge on handling investigations, preparing for interviews, and managing stress related to CIMS investigations.

#### **Chats with the CEO**

Throughout the year, ten "FCAV Chat with the CEO" sessions were held, allowing foster carers and agency staff to share their experiences with the FCAV. Key issues discussed included:

- Lack of respite options for long-term placements,
- inconsistencies in funding and support across divisions,
- the need for clear guidelines on what the care allowance covers, and
- the importance of peer support networks.



#### The 2023 National Foster and Kinship Care Conference: Tasmania



The FCAV was pleased to support a delegation of carers, staff and board to attend the National Foster and Kinship Care Conference at Wrest Point Casino in Hobart, Tasmania, 21–23 September 2023.

Over three days in September participants took part in sharing and learning about the needs, rights and voices of children and young people in care and their carers from around the country.

Sessions covered overarching traumainformed approaches, research and practice improvements from state and global perspectives. There was also discussion on day to day practices and resources that support children and young people in care and their carers.

The FCAV delegation of carers, staff and board gained so much from the sessions, meeting and networking with carers from around Australia and hearing about the innovative ways other states support homebased care.

ADVOCACY The FCAV drives advocacy on each of these issues for carers

The FCAV continues to advocate for systemic changes to carer conditions across several areas which carers have identified as negatively affecting carer morale, retention and recruitment. Key areas of focus include:

#### Care Support Help Desk

The DFFH Care Support Help Desk (the Help Desk) is an initiative that was developed by the FCAV in 2021 in response to the extensive delay in obtaining essential documents such as birth certificates, Medicare numbers and other placement supports such as immunisation records. The Help Desk was funded for an initial two-year period in the 2022/23 Budget and can be directly accessed by carers or agencies. The Help Desk has been extremely successful and has reported the following performance metrics since its inception in October 2022 to March 2024:

Received 9,822 calls.

- Submitted 2,990 birth certificate applications. 1,940 have been received.
- Submitted 3,200 Medicare applications. 2,506 have been received.
- Supported 4,660 children and young people

Carers report high levels of satisfaction with the improved service delivery enabled by the establishment of the Help Desk. Following FCAV advocacy as part of the development of the 2024/25 Victorian Budget, the Help Desk has now become a permanent DFFH service offering.

#### **Passports**

The FCAV advocated for an expansion of the Care Support Help Desk to include support and advice for passport applications. The demand for passports has increased since the end of COVID lockdowns because carers want to travel to visit family, friends or have a holiday. Passport applications are complex and time consuming because of stringent identity and documentary requirements and carers report they can take years to process. Carers also report that agency and Child Protection staff often lack the skill and expertise to complete passport applications in a timely manner and application supports and training are required to improve service delivery.

#### **Care Allowance review FAQ**

The FCAV has researched and developed information to inform and assist carers who want to apply for a review of the care allowance level they receive. The fact sheet sets out the process and criteria for applying for higher level payments. This is currently under DFFH review.

# National Foster and Kinship Care Collective (NFKCC)

The NFKCC has continued to meet to define and advocate for a better home-based care system nationally and explore the potential for the role of the Commonwealth in supporting standardised kinship and foster care financial and health supports. The peak bodies have approached Services Australia collectively on issues such as Family Tax Benefit A and B eligibility, Child Care Subsidies, Medicare and Medicare Dental, possibilities for a National Care Allowance, and superannuation.

#### **Medicare Dental**

The FCAV provided a submission to the fifth review of the *Dental Benefits Act 2008* advocating that all children in care be automatically eligible for Medicare Dental. Children in care generally have poorer oral health than children in the general population and currently access to Medicare Dental is means tested on a carer's income. This means that many children are ineligible for \$1000 of dental treatment over a two-year period.

The review recommended (Recommendation 17) that where possible access barriers to Medicare Dental for children in care be removed, including the consideration of legislative changes. The Federal Department of Health and Aged Care is currently implementing the recommendation and has established the Dental Clinical Advisory Committee to manage the implementation process. The FCAV met with the Department to discuss how the implementation of the recommendation will be progressed, and this is expected to be finalised in 2025.

#### **Regular meetings with Minister's Office**

The FCAV has established regular quarterly meetings with the Minister's office to advocate for carers on priority issues including:

- Care allowance payments and indexation
- Care Support Help Desk funding
- Passports
- Medicare Dental
- Systemic reform agenda for 2024

### Carer household and personal accident insurance

The FCAV has clarified that foster carers are insured for both household property damage and personal accidents incurred while volunteering by the Victorian Managed Insurance Agency (VMIA).

VMIA is a government insurance authority and its functions include acting as an insurer for, or providing insurance services to, government departments and community service organisations.

A fact sheet has been developed to provide information about the scope of the insurance cover and application process. This is currently under DFFH review.

#### **Services Australia**

The FCAV has met with Services Australia to discuss the operation of the Grandparent, Foster and Kinship Carer Adviser line (GFKAL). Services Australia advised that one of the biggest issues it encountered with carers was difficulties accessing the Child Care Subsidy (CCS). Several of those cases involved the over payment of the CCS and subsequent recovery action brought on the carer because they had initiated the CCS application and consequently were personally liable. Following the meeting, GFKAL have assisted a number of carers referred by the FCAV.

### Being Heard Care Allowance Campaign

Care Allowance is too low to cover the costs of aring for children and young people in Victoria. ''S TIME TO INCREASE THE CARE ALLOWANCE.



Children in home-based care in Victoria receive \$120 less per week compared to those in Canberra. This shortfall impacts the ability to afford essentials such as mobile phones, dental visits, therapies, and tutoring. Often, carers cover these costs, leading to an emotional, social, and economic burden on both the children and their carers, who volunteer for this challenging role.

In response, the Foster Care Association of Victoria (FCAV) and Permanent Care and Adoptive Families (PCAF) launched a campaign in June 2023 advocating to raise the care allowance in Victoria to align with other states. The current financial strain on carers has been exacerbated by inflation and a low indexation rate, which have diminished the allowance's value. The FCAV Carer Census (see p. 7) highlighted financial stress as one of the most challenging aspects of the role, contributing to the high attrition rate among carers.

#### **Campaign Launch and Progress**

The campaign was initiated by a committee that included FCAV and PCAF, advocating after years of lobbying the Government and the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing (DFFH) for an increase. There has been no net increase in the care allowance rate since 2016. The urgency of this issue is underscored by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare's data, showing that in 2022-23, 621 households exited the foster care system, while only 317 were recruited.

A commissioned report by KPMG, received by the state government in January 2022, recommended a 67% increase to the care allowance. A separate report by Cube Consulting, commissioned by the Centre for Excellence in Child and Family Welfare and DFFH, estimated that Victoria's 1,825 active foster carers provided economic benefits worth \$80 million in active caregiving and \$453 million in avoided costs by keeping children out of alternative care.

#### The Call to Action

The campaign was designed to enable carers and their supporters to directly petition for an increase in the allowance. The petition aims to demonstrate to policymakers the real-life impact of the insufficient care allowance on carers and the children and young people in their care. The Victorian Government is urged to implement a significant increase to the allowance, with age-appropriate adjustments, to bring payments in line with those in other states and to ensure it is indexed to meet inflation each year.



#### **Submission to Treasury**

In December 2023, we were invited to a meeting with the Treasurer's Office, where we advocated on behalf of carers and presented over 2,000 Care Allowance Petition submissions. Despite the clear urgency conveyed in these submissions, neither the Department of Treasury nor DFFH has committed to increasing the care allowance.

#### Next Steps

Submissions from those with lived experience have detailed the hardships of providing care under the current allowance rates. The campaign has successfully drawn attention to these issues, gaining support from Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations (ACCOs), Community Service Organisations (CSOs), larger sector advocates, and high profile media attention.

The campaign continues, and we seek further engagement with the Minister for Child Protection, Lizzie Blandthorn, and the Victorian Government in the upcoming Budget round.

# **FCAV Roadshow**

The FCAV launched a statewide Roadshow in July 2023 and the team has had the pleasure of visiting offices and hearing from local staff and carers about their foster carespecific support programs, regional issues, and themes in various metro and regional offices. To date, 35 visits have been made to agencies and ACCOs.

The FCAV uses the visits to provide detailed information to staff in relation to services available to foster carers which has been well received by agencies.

Throughout these visits, FCAV gathers valuable feedback, identifies common themes, and develops a deeper understanding of both the unique challenges and successes experienced by foster carers and support organisations all across Victoria. This comprehensive engagement enhances our understanding of the support and resources we can make available to carers or advocate for on their behalf.

Following the visits, agencies expressed a strong desire for ongoing dialogue. As a result, a CIMS webinar is being developed specifically for agency staff. This initiative aims to inform the sector to improve practice.

The Roadshow has been a platform to develop relationships across the sector, which in turn builds the confidence of agency staff to promote FCAV to foster carers. The FCAV aims to continue the Roadshow to reach all agencies and ACCOs in the next 12 months.

# **Treasurer's Report**

### **Stephen Bowers**

Treasurer



As of the end of financial year 2024, FCAV Net Assets are **\$756,480**, reflecting a notable increase of **\$178,635** compared to the previous financial year. This growth is primarily due to a bequest received during the year.

Our total income for the year amounted to \$1,295,745, a significant decrease from the previous year's figure of \$2,140,222. State Government funding accounted for most of our financial support, contributing \$835,828 which accounts for 68% of our overall income. The current financial year (in comparison to last), reflects the full transition of the organisation of the Carer KaFE (learning & development) program no longer operating under FCAV. Responsibility for this program was transitioned from FCAV management following the outcome of a public tender from 1 April 2023.

Whilst it is greatly appreciated that the Victorian state government has maintained its ongoing support of the organisation, FCAV will continue to explore alternative funding sources with a view to diversify its revenue streams. This strategy will assist the organisation to maintain its independence in decision-making processes around its operations, and is particularly important given current economic conditions resulting in donations further declining.

Our expenditure for financial year 2024 amounted to \$1,117,110. This allocation of funds reflects our ongoing commitment to our core programs and services.

This shift in our financial landscape necessitates careful planning and resource allocation to ensure continued sustainability. FCAV continues to meet this challenge, and has planned its future resource allocation carefully to ensure financial sustainability outcomes are met.


